In a unique and unprecedented gathering of Nobel Laureates and Leaders from around the world, the Laureates and Leaders for Children Summit 2016 New Delhi is convened with one overarching goal: to build a strong moral platform for a child-friendly world by globalising compassion for ending trafficking especially its worst forms like sexual exploitation and slavery everywhere.

Convened by Mr Kailash Satyarthi who won the Nobel Peace Prize 2014 for his *“struggle against the suppression of children and young people and for the right of all children to education”*, the Summit is designed to tap into the enormous intellectual and moral power, experience, influence and passion of the world’s established thought leaders to focus on the world’s most deprived children. Bringing together the collective leadership of approximately 25 laureates and leaders, young people and over 150 eminent personalities from various walks of life – academia, business, civil society, sports, arts and culture – the Summit will call the world to urgent action to allow children to remain children, all over the world.
